Vocabulary	Definitions
abrupt (adj)	sudden; unexpected; <b>broken</b> into what is expected
bankrupt (adj)	to be out of money; financially ruined; to " <b>break</b> the bank"
corrupt (adj)	evil; dishonest; to <b>break</b> away from honesty
corruptible (adj)	able to be influenced into doing something that <b>breaks</b> away from the rules; able to become bad
disrupt (v)	to <b>break</b> up; to cause confusion
disruption (n)	something that <b>breaks</b> someone's concentration; bothersome; annoying
erupt (v)	to explode; to <b>break</b> out with force
interrupt (v)	to <b>break</b> into someone's conversation
interruption (n)	something that <b>breaks</b> up what you were doing; an unplanned event that <b>breaks</b> up an activity
rupture (v)	to burst or <b>break</b> open (usually a body part)

Vocabulary	Definitions
conjoined (adj)	<b>joined</b> together; combined; united
conjugate (v)	to <b>join</b> together or match a correct verb in grammar
conjunction (n)	a word that <b>joins</b> two phrases or sentences
disjointed (adj)	not <b>connected</b> ; having no flow in thinking
join (v)	to get together or <b>meet</b> ; to become included
joint (n)	a place or part of the body where two bones <b>join</b> together, usually so they can move
joint committee (n)	a committee with members from both the Senate and the House of Representatives who <b>join</b> together and meet to discuss issues
jugular (n)	a vein that carries blood back to the heart from the head; a vein that <b>joins</b> the head and the heart
junction (n)	the place where two highways or two sets of railroad tracks cross or <b>join</b>
rejoin (v)	to <b>meet</b> or get together again
